
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COUNCIL MEETINGS AND AGENDA

- The City Council meets regularly on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month at 6:30 p.m. in the Council Chambers at City Hall, 500 Castro Street, Second Floor. Special meetings are called as necessary by the Mayor and noticed at least 24 hours in advance.
- Interested parties may review the agenda, minutes and staff reports at the Mountain View Library, 585 Franklin Street, beginning the Thursday evening before each meeting and at the City Clerk's Office, 500 Castro Street, Third Floor, beginning Friday morning. Agenda materials may also be viewed electronically at www.mountainview.gov. Staff reports are also available at the Council Chambers during the meeting.
- SPECIAL NOTICE Reference: Americans with Disabilities Act, 1990. Anyone who is planning to attend the next City Council meeting who is visually or hearing-impaired or has any disability that needs special assistance should call the City Clerk's Office at 903-6304 48 hours in advance of the Council meeting to arrange for assistance. Upon request, in advance, by a person with a disability, City Council meeting agendas and writings distributed during the meeting that are public records will be made available in the appropriate alternative format. Also upon request, in advance, an assistive listening device can be made available for use during the meeting.
- The Council meetings are cablecast live on Channel 26 on the Mountain View Comcast cable system and are replayed on Wednesday at 6:30 p.m. and on Saturday at 11:00 a.m. following that week's Council meeting. If there is a live Environmental Planning Commission meeting on a Wednesday, the replay of the City Council meeting will be on a Thursday at 6:30 p.m. In addition, Council Regular meetings are webcasted, and interested persons may visit the City's web site at www.mountainview.gov to watch the meetings live on their computer, laptop or PDA device. Archived broadcasts of previous meetings may also be accessed and watched on-line.
- The Council may take action on any matter noticed herein, and their consideration and action on the matters noticed herein is not limited by the recommendations indicated in the Agenda or staff report(s). The Council may consider and act on items listed on the agenda in any order and thus all those interested in an item listed on the agenda are advised to be present throughout the meeting (see Policy and Procedure A-13). The reading of the full text of ordinances and resolutions will be waived unless a Councilmember requests otherwise.
- By policy, no new items of business will be started after 10:00 p.m., unless an exception is made by vote of the Council.

ADDRESSING THE COUNCIL

- Interested persons are entitled to speak on any action item listed on the agenda and are requested to fill out the blue cards available at the rear of the Council Chambers and deposit them with the clerk or at the podium as soon as completed. This will assure that your name and city of residence are accurately recorded in the minutes and that your interest in speaking is recognized. If you wish to speak and are not recognized by the Mayor, please approach the podium prior to completion of discussion on the item. Speakers are allowed up to three minutes each, and if a large group wishes to express its views, it is more effective to have one spokesperson.
- Items on the "Consent Calendar" are not discussed individually but are approved as a group with one motion. If a citizen wishes to speak on an item on the Consent Calendar, he or she may come to the podium at the time announced by the Mayor and request that the item be pulled for discussion by the Council.
- Anyone wishing to address the Council on a nonagenda item may do so during the "Oral Communications" part of the agenda. Speakers are allowed to speak one time on any number of topics for up to three minutes.
- Reducing Time For Public Input: For any single agendized item and for Oral Communications from the Public, if there appears to be 15 or more speakers and the Council might not be able to conclude the scheduled agenda items for the meeting if speakers were allotted three (3) minutes each, the Mayor may reduce speaking time to no less than two (2) minutes per speaker unless there is an objection from Council, in which case majority vote shall decide the issue without debate.

RECOMMENDATION

1. Authorize a six-month extension of Energy Upgrade Mountain View (EUMV), from January 1, 2013 to June 30, 2013, to enable existing participants to continue receiving monthly energy usage reports and additional information to further reduce their use of energy.

- 2. Authorize the City Manager to amend the existing professional services agreement with High Energy Audits of Los Altos Hills, California (HEA), for an additional \$10,000 to provide monthly energy use reports and reduction strategies to EUMV participants.
- 3. Redesignate and commit \$10,000 in existing limited-period environmental sustainability funding for this expense.

BACKGROUND

In January 2011, the City Council authorized a \$319,000 professional services agreement with HEA to design and implement EUMV, a residential energy assessment and upgrade program. EUMV is funded with Federal Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant (EECBG) moneys. All EECBG funds must be expended by December 31, 2012, at which time the EUMV program is scheduled to end.

Residents signing up for the EUMV program receive a personalized analysis of their home energy use and based on their energy use profile, receive customized audit services, support, and recommendations to reduce their energy use and carbon emissions. EUMV participants also receive monthly energy usage alerts and additional information to help them make additional energy reductions.

To date, more than 1,200 residents have signed up for EUMV, but more than 65 percent of those sign-ups have occurred in the latter half of 2012, leaving little time for the City to track and report on actual energy savings resulting from the participants' actions.

Since its start in April 2011, the EUMV program has achieved the following results:

- More than 1,200 participants have enrolled in the program.
- The top 25 percent of EUMV participants, in terms of energy saved, have reduced their energy bills by approximately \$350 per year and their carbon emissions by an average of 974 pounds per year.
- The average EUMV participant has lowered their energy bill by \$42 per year and their carbon emissions by 134 pounds per year.
- Participants, collectively, have saved more than 84 megawatt hours (MWh) of electricity and 2,000 therms of natural gas, which is equivalent to the annual electricity use of 30 homes per year or to removing 15 cars from the road for a year.

ANALYSIS

At its October 18, 2012 meeting, the Council Environmental Sustainability Committee (CESC) indicated an interest in extending EUMV outreach efforts for an additional six months, through June 30, 2013, to enable: (1) existing participants to save more energy by continuing to receive monthly energy usage alerts, monthly energy saving tips, and on-line access to their home energy profile for tracking purposes; and (2) the City to derive more comprehensive, real-world data on the effectiveness of the program. No new EUMV sign-ups would be solicited during the six-month extension period. Staff recommends funding this extension with existing one-time environmental sustainability funding.

The CESC also discussed the possible continuation funding for the EUMV program beyond June 30, 2013. The CESC will discuss this topic in early 2013 and may submit a funding request to continue the EUMV program during the upcoming Fiscal Year 2013-14 budget development and approval process.

FISCAL IMPACT

The estimated cost of continuing energy use tracking and reduction services for current EUMV participants from January 1, 2013 through June 30, 2013 is \$10,000.

As suggested by the CESC at its October 2012 meeting, staff recommends the remaining balance of funding previously designated by the Council to support Green Mountain View's sustainability efforts (approximately \$7,300) be reallocated for this purpose, since Green Mountain View is on an indefinite hiatus. Other uncommitted one-time environmental sustainability funding can be used to fund the remaining \$2,700 cost of continuing the EUMV program.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Take no action and allow the EUMV program to end on December 31, 2012 as scheduled.
- 2. Continue providing the full range of EUMV services (including home energy use assessments for an estimated 250 additional new participants, customized support and services, monthly energy use alerts and reduction tips, energy tracking capabilities, and energy-saving devices) through June 30, 2013 at a cost of \$65,000.
